Here is what you need to know if you're considering being a part of this December event:

The Festival of Trees will take place at the Atwood House Museum on Saturday, December 2nd. The Atwood House will be open to the public 10am-3pm. Please consider digging up, dividing and potting some of your perennials for our Plant Sale in June while the soil is still soft and the weather is good!

Tips for overwintering perennials in pots: Huddle the pots for warmth. If you have multiple containers, group them together and place them in a protective corner.

Also, they'll be more protected from cold if you put them on the ground rather than up on a deck. And avoid locations with prevailing winds. It may also be beneficial to cover them with mulch to provide even more cold protection. Water the plants well before the first frost.

Fall, Winter or Spring Pruning?

Spring-flowering trees and shrubs should be pruned immediately after they finish blooming. If you prune them later in the growing season or during winter, you'll remove flower buds and decrease the amount of spring bloom.

**Summer-blooming trees and shrubs should be pruned in winter** while they're dormant, or in early spring just before they push out their new growth.

Fruit-bearing trees and shrubs should be pruned in early spring. The earlier the better. Pruning can be done any time temperatures are above twenty degrees and before spring growth starts

Don't prune any trees or shrubs in the fall! Just cut back your perennials...that will keep you busy!

Coonamessett Farm in East Falmouth has pumpkins of all sizes. and Coonamessett Farm lets you visit with its animals

as well. Additionally, <u>Bourne Farm</u> celebrates <u>Pumpkin Day</u>, a festival that features hayrides, pony rides, a petting zoo, and more. <u>Crow Farm</u> in Sandwich offers pick your own apples as well as pumpkins. <u>Tony Andrews Farm</u> in Falmouth hosts many pick-your-own produce. <u>The Pumpkin Patch</u> on the front lawn of the Chatham Congregational Church, 650 Main Street is filled with pumpkins, and will be open October 1st - October 31st. Hours are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily, rain or shine. Fall Festival at <u>Taylor-Bray Farm</u> in Yarmouth Port Saturday October 7th 11-3
